



Chiltern Open Air Museum is reopening!

Chiltern Open Air Museum, in Chalfont St Giles, Buckinghamshire, is re-opening for the 2025 season on **Saturday, March 8th**. After a winter break, the museum will once again invite visitors to explore its quirky collection of historic buildings, immersive exhibits, and beautiful natural surroundings. The museum provides an opportunity to take a journey through time to experience living history, with over 30 historic buildings, including an earth cottage, 1940s post-war prefab, blacksmith's forge and historic farm. Visitors can discover how people lived and worked in the past.

This year there are a number of exciting new and returning events, including a Medieval Festival over Easter from the 19 to 21 April with living history displays, knights, archery and Medieval court. Medieval Jousting will be returning on the 28 and 29 June. The epic Napoleonic Weekend on the 31 May and 1 June will be returning with a bang of canon and gunfire as 200 re-enactors take over the site with spectacular battle displays, living history and cavalry horses.

'We're thrilled to welcome back visitors to Chiltern Open Air Museum for the 2025 season," said Helen Light, General Manager at the museum. "Our team have been busy creating new interpretation and carrying out conservation works. We're excited to be launching a new digital guide, we will be hosting The Longest Yarn exhibition throughout August, and we have a spectacular events programme planned.'






The Lost Rivers of London

A talk on Wednesday 12th March 2025 at 2.00 pm by Alan Fitzgerald at CSP Community Centre, Gravel Hill, Chalfont St Peter SL9 9QX

Alan trained as a Mechanical Engineer as an apprentice. He continued as a designer in the Machine Tool industry, writing control systems software. This led on to success in the IT industry and Mergers and Acquisitions. He retired for the first time in 2002. After 6-months of boredom, he discovered Academia and returned to work full time for Kingston and Aston University.

Everyone is probably familiar with the river Thames in London, but how many know of the multitude of other rivers that flow through and under London? In 2026, The Hedgerley Historical Society will itself mark an historical milestone when it celebrates its 50th Anniversary. Founded by a small group led by Harry Kirby, the Society has gone from strength to strength and is to today one of the most vibrant and active local history societies in the country... the more remarkable given the size of the village.

In celebration, we will publish a completely revised edition of the history of the village. A first edition of such a history was produced in 1980 in paperback. This was added to by a second instalment in 1982. And then consolidated into a hardback edition in 2007. All of these were edited by then chairman, Michael Rice.

But history doesn't stand still. At least, our understanding of it. Since then, considerable additional research has shed new light on matters we had taken for granted. New technologies, such as LIDAR, have improved our understanding of what the fields around us reveal. So, we thought it apt to celebrate our 50th Anniversary with a completely revised and updated edition of the book. And I'm delighted to say that Julian Hunt, our most distinguished local historian, has agreed to re-write parts of it and add the latest research. In addition, Michael Rice has agreed to act as overall Editor, once again.

Our aim is for the new book to be published in March, 2026, in time for our anniversary.

Needless to say, the cost of this is considerable and will be underwritten by the Hedgerley Historical Society. However, we would like to invite all existing members, and the residents of Hedgerley and the surrounding villages, to be 'founder subscribers'. For the price of £25, you will receive a copy of the book on publication. ((I'm sure we can prevail on Julian and Michael to sign it, as well!) Sat 10th May 10-4 Our Lords and Masters: who owned Hedgerley (The Templars to the Stevensons) Julian Hunt Bookings open £15

Each year for the past 3 years we have run what is becoming one of our most popular fixtures in the calendar: our annual 'Study Day'. All villagers, whether members of the Society or not, are welcome. Subjects to date have included how to research the history of your home, the history of farming in Hedgerley, and last year, the very popular history of brickmaking in the village. Each study day combines some talks, the opportunity to examine documents and to learn a little about the process of historical research, a lunch, and weather permitting, a walk around the village to visit the sites relevant to the subject of the day.

This year, on Saturday, 10th May, the subject will be "Our Lords and Masters: who owned Hedgerley?" This subject, like some of the previous ones, ties in well with the publication of our new History of Hedgerley book, because some of the answers are to be found within it. You will know that most villages, with Hedgerley no exception, were occupied by the tenant farmers of landowners who might live at some distance.

Our objective in May is to learn more about the Manor of Hedgerley and the adjoining manors, and the many great landowners who at various times owned them. You will learn more about the role of Eton College in the affairs of the village, the Knights Templar and

their involvement, and some of the other great Lords who over the centuries laid claim to the village.

Speakers are still to be finalised, but as in previous years, will include Julian Hunt.

Members who attended Julian Hunt's talk on John Adams and Thomas Jefferson's Tour of England in 1786 will recall that Adams and Jefferson visited two landscape gardens in Buckinghamshire, designed by Capability Brown (during the ownership of the Grenville family), namely Stowe and Wotton House. The Pleasure Grounds at Wotton, currently undergoing restoration, were laid out by Brown between 1750 and 1767. A series of man-made features on the 3 mile circuit of the 50 acre lake include bridges, temples and statues.

I have arranged for the Estate Manager to lead a guided tour of the grounds and a short tour of the house followed by Tea and Cake. Therefore join us on the Summer Solstice as we explore this historic landscape at Wotton Underwood near Aylesbury. Tour and Tea £20. Bookings open now.

The Vache, which stands on the site of a medieval residence built by the Norman lords of the manor (de la Vache) on land granted by William the Conqueror. Later owned by the Fleetwood family and forfeited at the Restoration of 1660 because Fleetwood had signed Charles I's death warrant, it became the home of the Pallisers, friends of Captain James Cook, mariner and explorer, to whom the family erected a monument to him which can be seen in the grounds. 



Protect yourself from Holiday fraud: don't let fraudsters trip you up this summer.

People looking to snap up online holiday deals ahead of the summer are being warned to stay extra alert and do their research before booking their getaways, as new data reveals victims lost a total of over £11 million to holiday fraud last year.

Action Fraud, the national fraud and cybercrime reporting service, has launched a <u>holiday fraud</u> <u>campaign</u>, urging the public who are looking to snap up their next holiday deals online to look out for suspiciously enticing offers online, including on social media, and do their research before booking their getaways.

New data shows there were 6,066 reports of holiday fraud made to Action Fraud last year, with July recorded as the highest month of reporting with 647 reports.

Holiday makers lost a combined total of £11,183,957 in 2024, which is comparatively less than the £12.3 million lost in 2023. Despite, the drop in reported loss, the average loss per victim remains at similar levels, with £1,851 the average in 2023 and £1,844 in 2024.

What can you do to protect yourself from holiday fraud?

Check the travel company is legitimate: about to book a holiday? Do some research first to check that the company is legitimate, especially if you haven't used them before. Use consumer websites, or reviews from people (or organisations) that you trust. Look for the logos: look for the <u>ABTA</u>, <u>ABTOT</u> or <u>ATOL</u> logos on the company's website. If you're unsure, you can use the links below to verify membership:

Use a credit card to pay: use a credit card for payments (if you have one). Many of these protect online purchases as part of the Consumer Credit Act. Only provide required details at checkout: when making your payment, only fill in the mandatory details (often marked with an asterisk) such as your address. Unless you think you'll become a regular customer, don't create an account for the store. Keep your accounts secure: create a strong and unique password for your email. If 2-step verification is

available, always enable it. **Watch out for suspicious links:** whether it's in an email or social media post, be wary of promotions for unbelievably good holiday offers. If you receive a suspicious email, report it by forwarding it to: report@phishing.gov.uk

Dear All

It's a little early for Mole (of Wind in the Willows fame) to be on the move but here's a gentle update to begin the year.

Our annual dinner at The Ivy House in December was an excellent "do", much enjoyed by all. For 2025, we again have Mel Barnet as Hon Sec, Dave Cooper as Hon Treas. plus Maria Branton as the all important Social Sec.,and me.

Rainfall totals from September have been less than 2023/24 so, while groundwater levels remain very high they are a little below same time last year. The floodplain areas remain very wet and there is strong flow all the way from Mobwell Pond. It seems likely that we will have a good stream throughout the year but with slightly less risk of disruptive flooding.

Thameswater continue to work hard to reduce infiltration of groundwater into the sewer network and have completed a project to enable tankers to remove excess at Chalfont St Peter without closure of the High Street. Work to seal pipeline leaks and manholes is continuing up the valley; surplus from Chesham is now being tankered to Maple Lodge rather than transferred to the Misbourne area; local surveys and cleaning of the system is in hand; extra filtration and other improvements are part complete at the Amersham Balancing Tanks. The budget for improvements in the catchment has been increased to £10m and studies are looking at long term opportunities.

The CStP tanker facility was briefly used during two January storms. These came and went too quickly for the surge in additional flow in the sewers to be due to raised groundwater levels but demonstrated the huge amount of water entering the system from domestic roofs and hardstandings etc., which all ought to be going into soakaways or other SUDS. A residents group has begun highlighting this issue. It has produced a flyer - see attached - and is looking into potential areas for absorbent planting and other measures.

The Chiltern Chalkstreams Project Board has circulated a draft "Mending the Misbourne" action plan to various stakeholders for comment and expects to publish at the end of March. It has recently submitted an application to the HS2 Additional Projects fund for a 5-year, £1.7million project to involve dedicated staff and funding to the catchment, working on a similar model to the very successful Chess Smarter Water Catchment project. The plan prioritises improvements in water quality, management of flow, integrity of wildlife corridors and involving people with their local waterbody. It highlights some "big wins" including work to avoid sewage contamination at Amersham and Gerrards Cross and two major watercourse restoration projects as well as tackling invasive species of flora and fauna, an education programme and engagement with the development planning process.

A team in Affinity Water is also looking at possible restoration projects.

Concerns have arisen that plans to enlarge Heathrow airport might involve diverting 4 rivers into 2km-long tunnels and a fifth through a landfill site. This would disconnect the internationally-rare chalk streams of the Chilterns from the Thames. For Eels and other migratory fish on their way to St Albans, Hemel, Chesham, Amersham etc etc (or back to the Sargasso Sea) this would be catastrophic. I understand a shorter third runway might avoid this issue and the need to divert the M25 underground and move the incinerator station seems like something to encourage?

Chiltern Society volunteers and others are working to improve the watercourse through GX Golf Club, next Tuesday 18th February. Please contact me if you would like to know more and/or be involved.

In just a few weeks time, we will be looking for help with work parties - particularly at Chalfont St Giles and through Amersham. To set dates for these and chat about any or all of the above, we will have a not-a-meeting at The Greyhound on Thursday 26th Feb from 7.15 pm. All welcome!

Our WhatsApp group has also been busy in recent weeks with updates on Thameswater progress, details of bird and butterfly recognition events, latest pictures and more. If you would like to join the group, just let me know.

Village flooding: how YOU can help!

We can all contribute to reducing flooding by managing the water discharge from our properties. Keeping excess water out of our sewers and drainage systems is critical to preventing overloading and flooding. While the authorities work toward a long-term solution, every small step residents take counts. The actions we take at home influence how much water enters the sewage and drainage systems—and, ultimately, how severe flooding becomes. By working together, we can all help build flood resilience.

Why reducing runoff matters

Rainwater thats runs off from roofs, driveways and patios at the top of the village ends up in the sewers, drainage system and river, where overflows cause severe damage to homes and businesses.

By managing the water discharge from our own properties, we slow the flow and reduce the pressure on drains & sewers.



Average usage for a four-resident home generate around 568 litres of water discharge per day, which is all that should enter the sewage system.

Mis-connections of roofs and driveways can create an additional 5,500 litres per hour in intense storm conditions*

Simple water management to reduce load on sewage system during heavy rainfall



Avoid Running Water: Delay using dishwashers, washing machines, or taking long showers. Turn off the tap while brushing teeth or washing hands.



Run Full Loads: Wait until your dishwasher or washing machine is full.



Limit Toilet Flushing: And use half flush when possible.

Long-term water discharge management to reduce load on drains



Ensure Proper Drainage: Ensure that rainwater from your downpipes, patios and driveways is not illegally flowing to the sewer system or onto streets. Surface water drainage should adhere to local Building Regulations.



Install Water Butts: Collect rainwater by installing water butts on your downpipes. This reduces the volume of water flowing into drains and provides an alternative water source for your garden. In winter, drain water butts during dry periods ready for the next storm.

Use Permeable Surfaces: If renovating, opt for permeable materials like gravel or porous paving for your driveway. This allows rainwater to soak into the ground. Avoid creating large impermeable areas like tarmac or concrete that increase runoff.

Practical Steps for Flood Resilience



Clear Leaves and Debris: Regularly clear leaves and debris from drains around your home.



Green Up Your Garden: Planting shrubs, hedges, and trees helps absorb excess water and reduces pressure on drains and sewers




