

Dear All

A brief note this month, mainly because the threads outlined in February - engineering improvements by Thameswater, funding applications for "Mending the Misbourne', etc. and the planned work activities - remain "work in progress".

The extent of sewage flooding in Chalfont St Peter on 26th February was disappointing but it was brief and, hopefully, new TW protocols will minimise future occurrences. That event was possibly intensified by a fallen tree just downstream of the culvert, which we have since removed with a 220mm drop in river level.

The trend of high groundwater levels, strong springs, good flows up the valley continues but without last year's extremes so looking good for the summer.

A small team will be clearing some accumulations of winter debris in the Misbourne through GX Golf Club and investigating the tributary from Gerrards Cross next Tuesday morning.

Arrangements for work parties in April/May will be agreed at our next **not-a-meeting.** As always, there is more on our WhatsApp Group: let me know if you would like to join.

Dear All

Crazy British weather! Annual rainfall to end March '25 was about 560mm - just under 90% long term average, among lowest in last 60 years; annual rainfall to end March '24 was 930mm - 150% long term average, among highest in past 60 years! Despite exceptionally low rainfall in March, groundwater levels are still relatively high due to the exceptionally high rainfalls a year ago but now clearly below "exceptional" - see graph below. We can probably expect to see the wetlands drying quickly in the next month or two.

MRA volunteers have been busy again clearing several long standing, well built obstructions (boys will be boys!) through the woods adjacent GX Golf Course and beginning to open up the tributary that comes down from the Gerrards Cross Gravel Formation. Our planned spring work party at CStGiles was cancelled because another volunteer had already single handedly created an excellent regime from village centre thu' to the sheepfield - many days of hard work.

Instead, some of us worked to investigate the deposits at the outlet to the precinct culvert in CStPeter and downstream at Chiltern Hill Bridge. It was good to determine for sure at last that there is indeed a structural concrete base to both locations with well over half a metre of sediment in each location. Both are much wider than the general river up and downstream so flow is slower and, particularly as volumes reduce, more deposits will occur, further raising the bed and reducing the capacity through the village.

It was great to attend a conference to celebrate improvements on the River Chess and especially to learn of the various "Citizen Science" Projects. This link https://chesssmarterwatercatchment.org/citizen-science/ takes you through to their website which includes an on-line version of the excellent report. Much of this is typical of the work we will be able to build upon if/when similar funding for Mending the Misbourne is made available in upcoming determinations. Of course there is already a strong and dedicated team monitoring river fly invertebrates at 14 locations, and unparalleled monthly recording of groundwater levels since 1992 - not to mention expert birdwatchers and fishermen. Other sparks include a contact with University of Nottingham interest in monitoring pollution and a volunteer beginning a project to study the different plant habitats. Do let me know if you would like to join in any of this or, indeed, have an idea to initiate another study project.

If you do look at the Chess report, you will notice the high standard of the presentations. These are way above anything our current small committee has the time or ability to produce, (the Chess work had several full time employees at peak), but if someone out there has some basic skill in maintaining websites - we use Wordpress/Pagelayer - I would love a bit of help!

Our March "not-a-meeting" was well attended and had a lively buzz of varied conversations. **Work party dates of Saturday 26th April and Thursday 1st May** were agreed - probable locations being Amersham (Church to Tesco) and Bottom House Farm (downstream). Please let me know if you can join us. We also confirmed MRA would again have a stand at Chalfont St Peter Feast Day - as usual help will be appreciated. As always, plenty of posts in the WhatsApp Group - let me know if you'd like to join in.

"Not-a-meeting" April will be on Thursday 24th April from 7.15pm at The Greyhound - all welcome!



10 facts about our upcoming election:

- 1. Chalfont St Peter has local elections looming next month on May 1st.
- 2. Residents will get to vote twice once for the 2 candidates who will represent Chalfont St Peter on Buckinghamshire Council, and then secondly for the residents they want to represent them on CSP's parish council.



- 3. Residents will vote in different polling stations either the parish church hall, the leisure centre or up at the Epilepsy Centre.
- 4. Residents will receive a polling card through the post telling them where they will need to vote, if they are registered to vote.
- 5. You do NOT have to take the polling card with you to vote, but you WILL have to have photographic ID.
- 6. If you will struggle to get to the polling stations, you can apply for a Postal Vote BUT it must be done by 10^{th} April latest.
- 7. If you have family who may not be home on voting day, you can apply for a Proxy Vote so that you can cast their vote for them, but you must apply before 10th April.
- 8. If you will struggle to apply for a postal vote or proxy vote online, you can pick up a paper copy of the forms at our Age Concern Information Centre.
- 9. The polling stations are open from 7-10pm on the 1st of May.
- 10. Your vote is your voice please be sure to use it.

Over 35,000 account hackings reported in 2024

Protect your online accounts from hackers and enable 2SV: Action Fraud issue new warning about social media and email account hacking as new data is revealed.

This year Action Fraud and Meta are encouraging the public to protect their social media and email accounts as data shows there were more than 35,000 reports made last year.

Data shows there was a rise of social media and email account hacking reported in 2024, with a total of 35,434 reports made to Action Fraud, compared to 22,530 reports made in 2023.

Action Fraud, the national fraud and cybercrime reporting service, has launched a campaign, supported by Meta, to encourage people to take an extra step of online protection by enabling 2-Step Verification for each online account they have. The warning comes as reporting shows nearly £1 million was lost to hackers last year.

The most common motives for social media hacking were either investment fraud, ticket fraud or theft of the targeted account, reporting insights revealed.

Adam Mercer, Deputy Director of Action Fraud, said:

"As social media and email account hacking remains the most reported cybercrime this year, this Action Fraud campaign marks a critical issue for everyone who has online accounts. That's why we're raising awareness of the ways people can protect themselves online.

"Follow Stop! Think Fraud advice and protect yourself online: enable 2-Step Verification on each online account you have — this will help prove your identity and stop fraudsters trying to steal or access your valuable information. Secure your social media and email accounts by ensuring each password is strong and uses three random words. Remember to never share your passwords with anyone else."

David Agranovich, Security Policy Director, Meta, said:

"Scammers are relentless and continuously evolving their tactics to try and evade detection, which is why we're constantly working on new ways to keep people safe while keeping bad actors out. Two-Factor Authentication (2FA) is one crucial example of how people can add an extra layer of security to their Meta accounts, to help reduce the risk of scammers accessing your accounts. We've also started rolling out facial recognition technology to help people get back into compromised or hacked accounts and are always working on new ways to stay ahead of scammers."

In the reports made to Action Fraud, there were various different methods of hacking highlighted, these include:

On-platform chain hacking

This is when a fraudster gains control of an account and begins to impersonate the legitimate owner. The goal is to convince people to reveal authentication codes, including one-time passcodes, that are sent to them via text. Many victims of this type of hacking believe it's a friend messaging them, however the shared code was associated with their own account and the impersonator can now use it to access their account. Usually when an account is taken over, fraudsters monetise control of the account via the promotion of various fraudulent schemes, like fake tickets or crypto investment schemes, while impersonating the original account owner.

Leaked passwords and phishing

The other common method of hacking is when account details are gained via phishing scams, or the use of leaked information used from data breaches, such as leaked passwords. This becomes prevalent as people often use the same password for multiple accounts, so a leaked password from one website can leave many of their online accounts vulnerable to hacking.

What can you do to avoid being a victim?

2-step verification (2SV) will keep criminals out of your account – even if they know your password. Turning on 2SV gives your most important accounts an extra level of protection, especially your email and social media accounts. It can be turned on in a matter of minutes – time well spent to keep the fraudsters out. Find out how to enable it here. Email and social media passwords should be strong and different to all of your other passwords. A good way to make sure your passwords are 'long enough and strong enough' is to combine three random words to create a unique password which is easy to remember. Find out more here.
